## Fund Overview

This is an actively managed global shares fund. Holdings must be consistent with Australian Ethical's Ethical Charter, and uses principles-based positive and negative screening. The portfolio commits to align with UN Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Agreement.

## Ethical Concerns

### Investments

- ✗ Some investments in the Fund may be problematic for ethical investors, such as:
  - Social media/digital platform companies: Alphabet, Facebook and Twitter Inc.
  - Carbon intensive industries: e.g. Covanta Holding Corporation (industrials), Veolia Environment SA (utilities).

### Other concerns

- ✗ Underlying holdings are provided for all funds rather than specific investment options. Australian Ethical did however provide a full list of holdings for the International Shares Fund upon request.
- ✗ Different (potentially misleading) statements across different information sources. E.g. high-level statements on website and in reporting that Australian Ethical portfolio has "zero" investment in fossil fuels and avoids investment in other carbon-intensive industries, whereas there are exceptions where a company outweighs this with positive contributions in other ways.
- ✗ No individual fund-level information or reporting on climate/sustainability performance. Whole of portfolio data only.

## Good Points

- ✓ Fund uses a charter which excludes weapons, tobacco, nuclear power and uranium mining, systemic human rights abuses and labour rights violations. It applies negative screening criteria across other areas: fossil fuels and other carbon-intensive industries, palm oil, gambling, pornography, alcohol, genetic engineering, animal cruelty, unsustainable food production, native or old growth forest logging, offshore detention centres, and large-scale hydro-electricity.
- ✓ Fund preferences sustainability leaders. This is evident through holdings in positive industries including renewables, energy efficiency, sustainable water, pollution prevention, nutrition, major disease treatment, and education.
- ✓ Great commitment to sustainability and transparency including by being a [UNPRI signatory](#), [RIAA certified](#) and [IGCC member](#).
- ✓ Committed to a target of net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050 across its business and investment portfolio, consistent with the Paris Agreement. Publicly reports on performance against this target and other Sustainable Development goals.
- ✓ FY2019: Australian Ethical share investments produced 70% less CO2 than market benchmarks (S&P ASX 200 and MSCI World ex Australia); 6x more investment in renewable power generation than the global share market; and 3.1x alignment of share investments to UN Sustainable Development goals compared to a benchmark.
- ✓ Good transparency of [holdings](#) and [voting history](#), both easily accessed via the public website. Website also provides case studies of AE engagements, voting and advocacy activities across a range of issues, including climate change and human rights.
- ✓ Strong record of voting for climate change and social resolutions, plus strong record of engagement and advocacy on climate change (including through Climate Action 100+) and other issues.
- ✓ Australian Ethical only specialise in ethical investments.
- ✓ Australian Ethical has been B-Corp certified since 2014.
- ✓ Australian Ethical donates 10% of profits each year to charities and social impact initiatives. Since 2000, Australian Ethical has donated over \$3.5 million to positive impact initiatives around Australia and the world.

## About the 'Ethical Survey'

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### About the Ethical Advisers Co-Op

The Ethical Advisers Co-op is a group of 35 financial advisers who are passionate about ethics and finance. The Co-op was established as a not-for-profit over 10 years ago to enable likeminded financial advisers to work together to represent the voice of the consumer. We work to shift the super and investment industry into being more ethically aligned with their clients' objectives. The Co-op's nationwide membership of ethical financial advisers help over 3,300 Australians make financial decisions and invest in line with their ethical values.

### How the Leaf-System Works

The ethical rating is voted by Australian financial advisers who specialise in ethical investments (Co-op members). The advisers assess if fund ethics suit their average ethical client, and if it matches with the average client's expectations and objectives. The advisers consider how successful the fund is at; 1) removing industries and stocks harmful to the environment and society 2) including companies with environmental or social benefits, and 3) providing evidence of actions from the fund which benefit society and/or the environment. The quality of information the fund provides on its ethical policies, companies invested in, and proxy voting is important in assessing if a fund is as ethical as claimed. The final rating is an average of these votes.

Financial advisers are voluntarily participating to help ethical consumers gain a quick understanding of how the clients of a group of industry professionals view the ethics of each fund. The Co-op and the advisers do not receive any form of remuneration or reward for participating.
